

THE CONSTRUCTION SECTOR

The construction industry in Burnaby, Metro Vancouver and British Columbia has experienced two decades of impressive growth, with no end in sight. The industry offers immigrants a wide range of employment opportunities, from entry-level labourers through skilled trades.

In this profile we look at businesses involved in constructing, repairing, and renovating buildings, undertaking engineering projects, and subdividing and developing land. The sector also develops a diverse range of energy and transportation infrastructure. Businesses or people in this industry may work independently or as subcontractors.

In 2021, 215,800 British Columbians were employed in construction, representing 8.1% of provincial employment. Of the almost one million job openings forecast for B.C. in the 10 years leading up to 2031, about 8% (75,900) are expected in the sector. About 77% will replace retiring workers, with the other 23% to accommodate industry growth. Fully two-thirds of the jobs (75,900) will be located in the area described by Statistics Canada as Mainland:Southwest—essentially Metro Vancouver and the Fraser Valley, but also including the Sunshine Coast and Whistler corridor.

THE CONSTRUCTION SECTOR IN BURNABY

Located near the geographic centre of Metro Vancouver, Burnaby provides an accessible and relatively affordable place to live, while offering many employment opportunities. The City of Burnaby continues to emphasize high-quality design and construction in new urban developments to ensure the overall quality of the community.

As one of the fastest-growing major municipalities in Canada, Burnaby's active real estate market has a major economic impact on Burnaby's economy. Burnaby is expecting a significant increase in residential and commercial buildings and continues to set a record pace for construction. As of November 15, the City had issued 1,133 building permits in 2022 for a value of over \$2 billion.

The City of Burnaby is planning for numerous large-scale industrial and transportation projects, while residential and commercial construction is also forecast to remain strong, leading to continued growth in employment.





THE CONSTRUCTION SECTOR IN METRO VANCOUVER AND B.C.

Many immigrants working in the construction industry choose Burnaby as a place to live, due to its easy access to jobs throughout Metro Vancouver and the rest of British Columbia.

Currently there are reasons for optimism for the province's construction industry, but also some cautionary notes.

On one hand, all official forecasts point to continuing high population growth and construction demand. For example, the provincial government's WorkBC arm projects 75,900 job openings in the sector between 2021 and 2031, with 50,800 of those in Mainland: Southwest.

On the other hand, British Columbia Construction Industry statistics indicated a 2% drop in employment between 2021 and 2022. However, this was mostly due to supply chain disruptions, permitting delays and labour shortages, which in turn resulted in significant wage increases.

The general view remains that employment opportunities will continue to be strong, due to demographic considerations, population growth and the following list of very large, long-term projects currently underway.

WHERE THE JOBS ARE:

The provincial government's WorkBC arm attempts to anticipate the kind of jobs that will be most in demand and where they will occur.

Geographically, the chart below shows the regions where jobs are most likely to be located. On a regional basis, openings are forecast to be roughly proportionate to population, with southern areas slightly favoured. For example, Mainland/Southwest is home to just over 60% of the province's population, but accounts for 67% of projected job openings.



CONSTRUCTION IN BURNABY

Census 2021 shows 58.2% of Burnaby's labour force was employed, and 7.3% (9,805) of them worked in the construction sector, slightly lower than the 8% for Greater Vancouver area.




HIGH OPPORTUNITY OCCUPATIONS

The construction sector employs people in a wide range of occupations, involving different types of skills.

- Many are certified tradespeople and other skilled workers such as carpenters, electricians, and painters and decorators.
- Also common are trades helpers and labourers, and positions in management, business, finance and administration (e.g., contractors, supervisors).
- Construction workers may also be involved in operating, maintaining, and installing equipment.
- Skilled administrative and business occupations make up a smaller portion of the industry.




INTERESTING FACTS ABOUT CONSTRUCTION IN BC:

Some things you may not know about construction in B.C.

- In 2021, British Columbia's construction sector accounted for 9.7% of the province's Gross Domestic Product (GDP) for a total contribution of \$25.4 billion.
- Skilled worker shortages in British Columbia's construction sector continue to be a major issue, with a potential shortfall of more than 25,000 workers by 2028
- The average weekly wage in British Columbia's construction sector was \$1,334 in October 2022, higher than the provincial average by 10%.
- The construction workforce has traditionally been male dominated, with only 14.6% of those employed in the sector being female in 2021.
- In 2021, 65.4% of the workforce in the construction sector was in the 25 to 55 years age range. Young workers (15-24 years) accounted for 14.3% of the construction workers, and workers over the age of 55 accounted for 20.3%.
- Majority of the construction labour force work full-time.
- Construction trades helpers and labourers accounted for 7.1% of the sector's workers in 2021.
- Self-employment is much more common in construction than in most other industries. About 30% of construction workers are self-employed, double the average for all industries in the province.
- Residential, commercial and institutional buildings are most likely to be built in the more densely populated areas of the province, while many heavy or engineering construction projects occur in more sparsely populated areas.
- November 30 is National Construction Day, when the sector "celebrates the dedicated, hard-working people instrumental in building and connecting our communities through infrastructure.

RECRUITING IMMIGRANTS TO THE CONSTRUCTION SECTOR

The construction sector is currently experiencing significant skills and labour shortages, which enhance employment opportunities, even as they threaten the industry's ongoing health. Traditionally many immigrants entered the sector as entry-level labourers—and demand remains high—but efforts to recruit skilled tradespeople have greatly increased. Pre-arrival, immigrants may wish to investigate the Integrating Newcomers program operated by the B.C. Construction Association. It attempts to match immigrants in the trades with construction companies seeking those trades and assigns immigrants a career coach to help ease credentials and relocation issues and aid them in finding the best fit.
